On Thursday, April 11, at 8:00 – 9:00 p.m., the Environment Committee will host a Town Hall Zoom Forum to share information with Somerset residents about our Town Apiary and learn about the behavior of bee colonies. This most certainly will be a fascinating opportunity to learn about how bees build their homes, and where they go during the day to drink, and pollinate. Please bring yourselves and children as well!

Composting

As discussed in the previous months in our *Town Journal*, the Town Council is considering distributing compost buckets to the entire Town. Forty-one percent of our Town residents currently compost. This is an important way to reduce the amount of landfill we create individually and collectively. Presently, about 30% of all food is discarded in the U.S. It is extremely important to repurpose our food scraps for the creation of high-quality topsoil for farmers, among other uses. Please join us on this Town Hall Zoom

Forum (date and time above), to learn about Compost Crew, our compost contractor, which is responsible for collecting our food scraps (vegetables, meat, bones, other foods, soiled paper, etc.) every Tuesday morning. For those who do not yet compost, this is and will continue to be a



free service provided by the Town.

Town of Somerset Election News: Plan for Town Election Tuesday, May 14, 2024

The Town of Somerset Election Day is Tuesday, May 14, 2024. Voters will have the option to vote in person at Somerset Town Hall on Election Day between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. or by mail-in ballot. This year's election is for Mayor and two Council seats. The candidate for Mayor is incumbent Jeffrey Slavin (Warwick) and the candidates for Council are incumbents Robin Barr (Essex) and Stephen Surko (Uppingham).

Voter Registration Procedures

- Every person who (1) is at least 16 years of age, (2) has resided within the Town for at least 14 days immediately preceding the election, and (3) is registered with the Town and/or the Montgomery County Board of Elections, is a qualified voter of the Town.
- Registration is permanent so long as the voter is a qualified resident. Voters already registered need not re-register.
- A Town resident may register to vote by requesting a voter registration card from the Town Manager and delivering a completed card to the Town Office during normal business hours by election day, May 14, 2024, but ideally before April 16.
- Due to the uncertainty of obtaining current
 Montgomery County voter rolls, all residents of the
 Town who have moved into the Town, or come of
 voting age, since June 1, 2023, are encouraged to fill
 out a Town of Somerset voter registration card so the
 voter list can be updated for the 2024 election.



Voters may vote by mail or in person

- To receive a mail-in ballot, a voter may pick up a ballot and return envelope during normal business hours at Town Hall after April 25, 2024. Any voter who is unable to pick up a ballot in person may request one by e-mail to the Town at Election@ townofsomerset.com no later than 5:00 p.m. on Monday, April 29, 2024 in order to allow sufficient time for a ballot to be issued and voted. Mail-in ballots must be postmarked no later than Tuesday, May 7, 2024 or received by the Town by 5:00 p.m. on May 14, 2024 in order to be counted.
- There will be in-person voting at Town Hall on Tuesday, May 14, 2024 from 5:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The Remarkable Life of Tania Palmer

Longtime Somerset resident **Tania Palmer** (Falstone), who passed away on February 5, had a remarkable life. As neighbors on

Falstone Avenue, we did not know much about her history until we had a casual conversation following the death of her husband, Richard. She had begun disposing of things she had accumulated over many years, and we commented that she had saved a lot. She replied, "I guess it's hard to let go of things when you've been told to put everything you want to keep in one suitcase." Her remark opened up a long conversation that revealed an amazing story. I don't have room here to do more than hit the high points.

(The following article draws extensively on research carried out by a historian, Shelley Stokes, in 2017.)

Tania's full name was Tatiana Ai-Ling Tann. She was born in Berlin in 1928, the daughter of a Chinese diplomat, **Beue Tann** (formerly Trent). Her mother, **Natalia**, was a Russian émigré.

Growing up in Berlin, Tania lived in privileged circumstances. Her father interacted with many high-level leaders.

She recalled sheltering during bombing raids after World War II started. In 1941, her father arranged for the family to travel to the United States. They located in Washington where her father continued with the Chinese diplomatic service.

After the war ended in 1945, her family went back to China, where they lived in comfort. However,

their lives were turned upside-down again by the Communist Revolution As members of a high-ranking family, they were at great risk, and one day her father unexpectedly told Tania that she had 24 hours to pack everything she wanted to keep in a single suitcase, so they could flee to Taiwan.

In 1950, Beue Tann returned to Washington as part of the Chinese diplomatic delegation. Later, he joined the International Monetary Fund. Because Tania had wisely kept her high school transcripts in that one suitcase, she was able to attend Smith College, graduating in 1952.

The Tanns moved to Somerset in the early 1950's, living on Trent Street for many years. Beue Tann died in 1982 and Natalia in 1991. In 1958, Tania married **Richard Palmer**; the couple bought the house at 4712 Falstone Avenue where she lived the rest of her life. Richard worked at the State Department and the World Bank. He died in 2013. They are survived by two children: Christina, who lives in California, and Andrea, who lives in the Bethesda area. Her friend and caregiver, Elaine Fedrick, was also an important part of her life in her final years.

Tania was soft spoken but gregarious with a great sense of humor, and fond of socializing. She loved ballet and went to a class into her 90's. She also helped with flower arranging for the National Cathedral. Her accent belied her cosmopolitan background – it was a little hard to place but had German and British traces. Up to her death, she enjoyed a glass of sherry every afternoon – possibly a way of recalling her childhood in the rarefied world of international diplomacy.

Reflecting on Two Years in Somerset

In May 2022, our family went to our very first Somerset Back to School Classic. It was a gorgeous spring day – this particular race had been delayed from October 2021. The intersection of Dorset and Warwick was filled with hundreds of people who all seemed to know each other, smiling, laughing, and enjoying the morning. However, we did not see a single familiar face.

Just over two months before, we had moved from D.C. to Somerset. Though several kind neighbors had stopped in to say hello, we really hadn't met many people. My husband and I, feeling intimidated by the scene, looked at each other that day in May and decided to put a pin in that moment and see how things had changed the next time the Classic came around.

In the intervening months, I posted questions to one of the private listservs used by Somerset residents. It resulted not only in helpful responses but also in kind invitations to join people on their porches. The pool opened and our kids became Dolphins (and we learned how to clearly – and quickly – record times at meets). Camp Summerset and Somerset Girls Club helped our twins meet other kids in the neighborhood and we started meeting more families when they started third grade at Somerset Elementary that fall.

October 2022 rolled around and, with it, the regular running of the Somerset Classic. This time, though, our situation was entirely different. The camaraderie we had seen five months before was not something we were looking at from the outside. You all had folded us into your community. In just a few months, we had met and been befriended by more people than we had in the previous eight years in our former neighborhood.

We just celebrated two years in Somerset and while I know you all are aware of what a unique place this is, I wanted to take a moment to let you know how special it has been from a newcomer's perspective. Not only the residents, but the school, its stellar teachers, staff, and amazing new principal have been more than we hoped for. Most of all, our children have found an independence they would not have had before. In fact, I had time to write this piece

because they stayed after school to play with friends on the playground, and they'll all walk home together in time for dinner. That is a Somerset childhood, one we are grateful to give them. To list all the ways this Town has been good to us would take too long. No place is perfect, but Somerset has something I think is better: a great heart.

The pandemic changed our life plans in unexpected ways, as it did for many. We didn't intend to leave our home in D.C. Once it became clear that we needed to, though, we were not looking for a house, we were looking for a neighborhood. Somerset, thank you for being exactly what we were looking for.

By the way, the next Somerset Classic will be October 6. We already have it on our calendars because we will be helping out this year. We look forward to seeing you there.

Manager's Corner

Before I offer my farewell to Somerset (see page 13), please allow me to run through several projects that are top of mind this month:

Stormwater Evaluations

Bayland Consultants & Designers has begun its work evaluating the "micro-watershed," in the area around the Dorset/Warwick intersection, which was identified by the Stormwater Management Study Committee's report. Bayland will gather data (including talking to residents), provide analysis, and make recommendations for ways that flooding can be controlled and stormwater adequately managed in the area. The total length of the project is likely to take several months to complete with a full report to the Council, which will determine what its next steps will be to address the issues that are identified and solutions that are recommended.

LED Streetlight Conversion

"Phase 2" of the streetlight conversion project was completed at the end of February, and the project should be completed by Pepco in April, concluding this long-awaited improvement to Somerset. This marks a huge milestone for the Town, and we should begin reaping the benefits immediately – from a safety perspective, the streets are more uniformly lit, with a lower risk of streetlight outages (however, if for any reason there is an outage, please reach out directly to Pepco or to the Town Hall to report to Pepco). Environmentally, the Town will use about 1/3 of the electricity for the streetlights in Town, which should in turn reduce our electrical bills significantly.

Pool Renovation

This project remains highly weather-dependent but has gotten back on track in March. The goal is to pour concrete sometime in April in preparation for the pool's opening in May ahead of Memorial Day.

Streets/Sidewalks

The Town staff is contacting firms to carry out routine maintenance for the street and sidewalk infrastructure in Town, including fixing tripping hazards on the sidewalks. Residents can play a part in helping to keep the sidewalks clear by removing plantings back that are overhanging the sidewalk, and trimming them so as not to interfere with those using the sidewalks.

Town Entrances and Plantings

The Town is in negotiations with the County on a memorandum of understanding to move forward on the beautification of the Town's entrance at Little Falls Parkway. In addition, Groundsmith Collective is finishing a design and maintenance manual for the Town's green spaces, including the entrances, rain gardens throughout Town, and parks. This manual will be completed later in 2024 and will help improve long-term maintenance of the Town's public spaces, and ensure that the Town stays beautiful and uses sustainable vegetation.

Town Budget

The Town is in the midst of its budget preparation. As mentioned in the *On the Docket* column (see page 14), the Town's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. The Budget Committee Chair may offer a review of the budget, but I have offered a very short summary in *On the Docket*. As mentioned, the Town remains in excellent fiscal standing. Several exciting capital projects are scheduled and budgeted for next year, and the Town does not project any needed increases in the property tax rate to sustain its current level of services, despite an expected increase of up to 40% in the cost of trash and recycling pickup.

Final Thoughts

With transition and turnover, there is bound to be disruption. Please, as I mentioned in my farewell letter to the Town, work with the Town staff as they power through the transition of my exit, and show them the grace and appreciation that they deserve. It is an unfortunate reality that in a small operation like the one here in Somerset, certain functions are entirely or largely dependent on one individual. So, when they exit, it can take some time to get things back on track and figure out the new best way forward. Somerset has dedicated, hard-working, and good people working for the Town. I know that the future is bright in Somerset. I will be cheering you on from afar. And I'll send a picture of baby Trollinger whenever he or she arrives.

A Monthly Review of Town Council's Activities

FOR ADOPTION

A Resolution Sunsetting the Town of Somerset Police Program

This issue has been heavily discussed at several Town Council meetings and work sessions, and was recommended by the Town's Public Safety Committee and Traffic Committee. The Public Safety Committee wrote an extensive memo regarding the Town's current police program, which hires off-duty Montgomery County police officers in a "secondary employment" capacity for a small number of rotating hours, to supplement the regular coverage provided by Montgomery County Police Department.

In this proposal, the Town's supplemental secondary employment police program will end at the end of April. The Town will continue to be provided regular coverage by the Montgomery County Department of Police, and will look for alternative methods to provide traffic calming and other safety measures.

An Ordinance Adopting the FY25 Budget

The Town's fiscal year runs July 1 – June 30, so the budget will be introduced in April, and adopted in May after a public hearing. Major highlights of the proposed budget include:

CAPITAL PROJECTS

- Hiring a lighting consultant to do a photometric evaluation of the new LED streetlights and offer recommendations for additional lighting, including new poles, pedestrian sidewalk lights, etc.
- Major implementation of roadway and sidewalk master plans, including an evaluation of sidewalk extensions on streets that do not currently have sidewalks
- Solar panel installation at the Town Poolhouse
- Improvements to the Town tennis courts to repair cracking

OPERATIONAL BUDGET

 The biggest change is an anticipated increase in trash/ recycling collection fees

The bottom line and good news is that the Town remains in a fiscally stable state. Property tax rates are not recommended or anticipated to increase, and the Town continues to make progress towards its goal of saving for a Rainy Day Fund equivalent to 12-months of operational expenses.

The budget will be shared with Somerset residents in the May issue of the *Town Journal*.

An Ordinance establishing a Data Policy

In accordance with State law, the Town Attorney has helped draft a data policy consistent with some of our neighboring municipalities. The policy will establish standard security measures for Town equipment and the Town Hall itself, and reporting requirements in the event of a data breach. It will also reinforce document retention protocols in alignment with the Town's already-established document retention policy.
